Sales

- Bake sale
- Yard/garage sale
- Lemonade stand
- Make dog treats to sell at local shelters, dog parks, or doggie daycare centers
- Sell cookies or chocolate bars
- Make and sell jewelry or crafts

Services

- Car wash
- Yard work
- Dog walking/dog sitting
- Run errands for elderly people
- Babysit
- Clean houses
- Teach someone to use a computer or smartphone
- Set up a social media account for a local business
- Clean up your school's stadium/gym after games

Donations

- Ask local businesses or civic organizations to help fund your trip

- Sites like [GoFundMe](#) or [Fundly](#) let supporters donate money online directly to you
- Ask for money through Facebook and Twitter

- Friends and family
- Local businesses—talk to your local visitor's bureau about where to start
- Civic organizations—Rotary Club, Kiwanis Club, Lions Club, etc.
- Church groups
- Community foundations
- Ask your teacher about opportunities with your school
- Talk with your teacher or principal about visiting a school board meeting—school board members are generally connected with the community and care about education
- Look for current sponsors of Oklahoma History Day in your district
- Local chapters of national organizations like Daughters of the American Revolution and 4-H
- Libraries, museums, or universities near you
