

FINAL SURVEY REPORT

INTENSIVE-LEVEL SURVEY OF THE CENTRAL PARK, JEFFERSON PARK AND PASEO NEIGHBORHOODS IN OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLAHOMA

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ABSTRACT

This document serves as the final survey report for the Intensive-Level Survey of the Jefferson Park, Paseo and Central Park Neighborhoods, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. The Oklahoma State Historic Preservation Office undertook the survey between November 1991 and March 1994. Project personnel conducted the survey in order to locate, identify, and document potential districts, buildings, objects, structures and sites within the designated area that meet the criteria for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. The survey involved two basic components: (1) Field research to record minimum documentation on each property, regardless of age or condition, within the survey area. (2) Archival research sufficient to prepare a brief historic context of the development of each of the residential additions surveyed.

The survey covered eighty blocks of residential development within inner city Oklahoma City. A total of 1408 properties were minimally documented; 390 in the Jefferson Park Neighborhood, 339 within the Paseo Neighborhood, and 679 in the Central Park Neighborhood. Of the total 1408 structures, 1120 (79.5 %) were designated as contributing resources to the three identified Historic Districts. Four (.4 %) of the 1120 contributing properties were determined to be individually eligible. 277 (19.7 %) of the remaining properties were classified as noncontributing due to lack of integrity or insufficient age. Eight (0.6 %) properties were initially evaluated as contributing but, since the survey, have been demolished, while three (0.2 %) noncontributing properties were also torn down. This report and the individual property files, will provide a basis for nominating eligible properties to the National Register and for evaluating properties under the review and compliance program established by Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended.

INTRODUCTION

Beginning in late 1991, the Oklahoma State Historic Preservation Office conducted an intensive-level survey of the Central Park, Jefferson Park and Paseo neighborhoods. Located approximately three miles northwest of downtown Oklahoma City, all three neighborhoods were constructed primarily prior to 1930. Although predominately composed of single family homes, the districts also contain a significant concentration of historic apartment houses. The dominant architectural style within each neighborhood is the Bungalow/Craftsman style, with the Tudor Revival style being the next most popular. Other architectural styles present include National Folk, Colonial Revival, Classical Revival, Mission/Spanish Colonial Revival and Prairie School.

The survey was undertaken to facilitate Section 106 review, identify potential National Register Districts and due to neighborhood interest. Project personnel include former staff Architectural Historian Marsha Weisiger, staff Architect Harry Simms, staff Architectural Historian Susan Allen and staff Research Assistant Cynthia Smelker, as well as temporary staff field surveyor Dr. Mary Jane Warde. All staff personnel meet the Secretary of the Interior's qualifications. The project also utilized volunteers Jennifer Perryman, David Thach and Jocelyn Lupkin.

PROJECT OBJECTIVES

The intensive-level survey of the Jefferson Park, Central Park and Paseo Neighborhoods included the following objectives:

The first objective was to minimally document each property located within the study area. Minimal documentation includes completion of the Historic Preservation Resource Identification Form and two elevation photographs for each resource.

The second objective was to evaluate each resource's eligibility for inclusion in National Register Historic Districts. This involved classification of each property as contributing or noncontributing resources to the proposed district. Properties were categorized as noncontributing for one of two reasons: (1) lack of integrity; or, (2) insufficient age. Due to the length of time the survey has spanned, project personnel identified several properties which have been torn down, as such these properties were ranked contributing demolished or noncontributing demolished. Several properties were also identified as individually eligible for the National Register.

The third objective was to delineate boundaries for potential National Register Historic Districts. To facilitate this process, a map for each residential addition was prepared showing the classification of each property; individually eligible, contributing, noncontributing, contributing demolished, noncontributing demolished. Additionally, the decade of construction was also coded on separate maps to allow for assessment of the development time frame.

The fourth objective was to prepare a brief historic context of the development of the residential additions surveyed. This component, in addition to the final report as a whole, will aid in the formation of National Register Nominations, as preliminary identification and research of reference material necessary will be completed.

AREA SURVEYED

The study area for this survey consisted of three inner city residential neighborhoods, Jefferson Park, Paseo, and Central Park, located in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Covering eighty blocks, the study area was bounded as follows: Starting at initial point of 36th Street and Walker Avenue, south on Walker Avenue to 30th Street, east on 30th Street to the midblock east of Robinson Avenue, south on that line to 23rd Street, west on 23rd Street to Western Avenue, north on Western Avenue to 36th Street, east on 36th Street to initial point. The study area did not include the Spanish Village, listed on the National Register in 1983. The boundaries of the Spanish Village were defined as a crescent shaped district bounded by North Dewey Avenue on the east, the alley between Northwest 28th and Northwest 29th streets on the south, North Lee Avenue on the west, and Northwest 30th Street on the north. The boundaries indicated travel through the midsection of the streets except as otherwise described. A map depicting the study area follows.

All three neighborhoods were initially settled as 160 acre homesteads. The Jefferson Park area occupied the southeast quarter of Section 21, while Central Park embraced the northwest quarter and the Paseo the southwest. Platting of the homesteads into residential additions generally began after the turn-of-the century. The Paseo district contains two exceptions to this. Fairlawn Cemetery and the first Guernsey Park Place additions were both platted in 1892. The cemetery expanded with several additions after 1900 but the first Guernsey Park Place plat was vacated in 1899.

Various additions comprised each of the three neighborhoods. All additions, however, were annexed by Oklahoma City and at least initially platted by 1910, with different subdivisions and replats occurring later. The names of the three districts were derived from the principal additions or significant features of the neighborhoods.

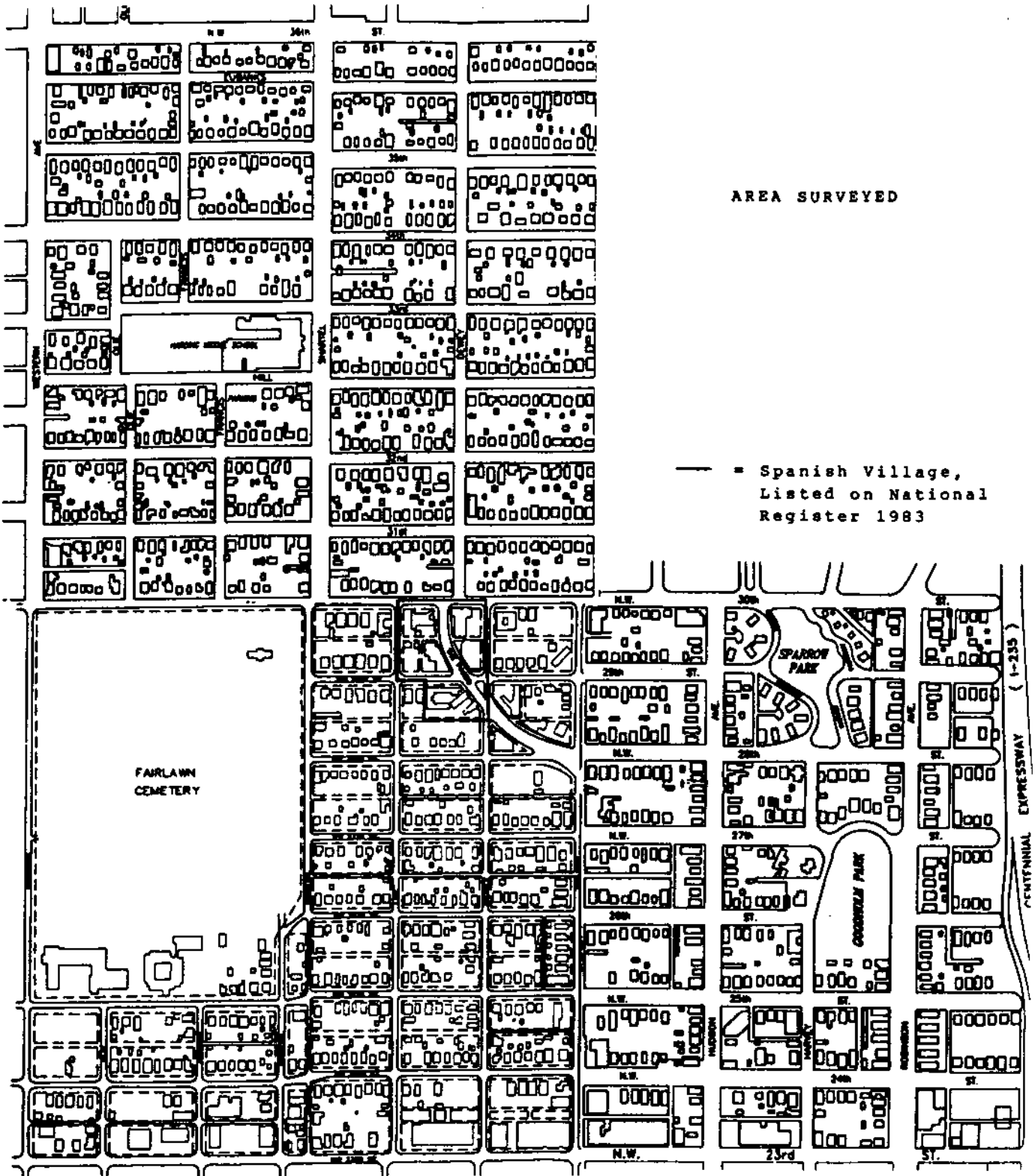
The Jefferson Park neighborhood was fabricated primarily of the Jefferson Park Addition, platted in 1903 and annexed into the city by 1908. This addition encompassed the southeast, southwest and northwest quarters of the quarter section. In July 1909, the Second Jefferson

Park Addition was platted into residential blocks and lots. This plat incorporated the previously unplatted northeast quarter of the original 160 acre homestead. The original Jefferson Park Addition was amended twice in 1909 and once in 1924. One of the 1909 amended plats was relatively insignificant. This amended plat merely divided all of Block 3 into east-west lots, eliminating the north-south lots characteristic of the blocks facing on to Harvey Avenue. The remaining 1909 amended plat significantly altered the original configuration of the entire neighborhood by changing the nine blocks bounded by Twenty-fifth Street, Hudson Avenue, Thirtieth Street and Robinson Avenue. This new plat created the curvy streets and blocks characteristic to only Jefferson Park. The amended plat also established the only two parks in the three neighborhoods, Sparrow and Goodholm. In early 1924, the Marrs Amended Plat of Block 1 was platted. The original neighborhood boundaries extended east to the Santa Fe railroad tracks, however, in the 1980s construction of the Centennial Expressway eradicated many of the structures located east of Robinson Avenue. The neighborhood's name originated from the name of its two additions, Jefferson Park.

The Paseo neighborhood contains the Fairlawn Cemetery, Guernsey Park Place, and Pleasant View additions. The northwest quarter of the quarter section, Fairlawn Cemetery, was initially platted in 1892. Additions to the cemetery were made in 1904 and 1913. In about the 1930s, the cemetery purchased the adjacent land on the south side to equal the forty-four acres presently encompassed by the cemetery. The Guernsey Park Place Addition, embracing the east half of the quarter section, was first platted into out lots in 1892. This plat was vacated in 1899 except for Blocks 2, 3 and 5. Guernsey Park Place was platted again, this time into standard residential lots, between 1902 and 1903. The original Pleasant View Addition, comprising the southwest quarter of the quarter section, was also platted in 1903. All three additions underwent several replats and subdivisions after being incorporated into the city limits between 1907 and 1908. The only major subdivision in the neighborhood occurred in 1927 with development of the Spanish Village. This subdivision of the northeast corner of the Guernsey Park Place Addition was zoned for both residential and commercial purposes.

A distinctive two block long curved street, the Paseo, was created as the hub of the area. The district's name was derived from this street.

The Central Park district was fashioned from the Grand View, Central Park, Central Northwest Highland and Ross-Mann additions. The Grand View Addition, equalling about 23 acres in the southwest quarter of the quarter section, was platted in 1904 and incorporated into the city by 1908. Central Park, the east half of the quarter section, and Central Northwest Highland, comprising about ten acres of the far northwest quarter of the quarter section, were both platted in 1907. The final addition, Ross-Mann, was platted in 1909 occupying the central portion of the west half. All three additions were annexed into the city between 1907 and 1910. The 1910 amended plat for block 6 of the Central Park addition concluded formation of Central Park. The neighborhood was named after the Central Park addition as it comprised the entire west half of the district.



RESEARCH DESIGN

The staff of the Oklahoma State Historic Preservation Office conducted an intensive-level survey of three neighborhoods in Oklahoma City: Jefferson Park, Paseo (excluding the Spanish Village) and Central Park. The Central Park Addition was identified in 1982 by the City of Oklahoma City as warranting further study to determine eligibility for listing in the National Register of Historic Places.

This cultural resource investigation was accomplished as part of the ongoing Oklahoma Comprehensive Survey Program, supported in part by state and federal funds. The overall purpose of this program was to increase the area surveyed within the state, assess eligibility for inclusion in the National Register, and facilitate Section 106 review.

This project emphasized the recording of extant properties at a minimum level of documentation and was designed to provide a cost effective approach for increasing not only the area inventoried within the state but also the number of recorded properties. The results of this project provide a basis for nominating eligible properties to the National Register and for evaluating properties under the review and compliance program established by Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act.

The project also served to provide a brief historic context which will aid in the development of National Register nominations. The historic context identified reference material relevant to the development of the residential additions, as well as provided a preliminary document for future National Register nominations. To accomplish this goal, research was undertaken at the Oklahoma City Public Library, University of Oklahoma Library, Western History Collections at the University of Oklahoma, and Oklahoma Historical Society. Sources utilized include the 1922, 1946 and 1954 Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps, Polk City Directories dating from 1906 to 1989, periodical articles from The Chronicles of Oklahoma, books concerning local history such as Roy Stewart's Born Grown: An Oklahoma City History, newspaper articles from the local Daily Oklahoman and Oklahoma City Times, among other sources.

All properties recorded in the survey area were documented to the

following standards: All individual properties regardless of age or condition were minimally recorded and photographed. Minimum recording includes completion of the Historic Preservation Resource Identification Form and two elevation photographs. The project was conducted in accordance with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Identification and Evaluation, and guidelines for intensive-level surveys set forth in National Register Bulletin #24.

Upon completion, the survey results were recorded onto survey maps. The boundaries of the three eligible historic districts were delineated. Each property was coded on the map to indicate that it contributes or does not contribute to the proposed district. In addition, properties which have been demolished since the survey were coded on the map as contributing demolished or noncontributing demolished. Maps referencing the decade of construction for each building were also created, overall indicating the frame of development for each neighborhood.

The individual property files will be added to the Oklahoma Landmarks Inventory. Photocopies of the final report, survey maps, and photographs from the individual property files will be provided to the city of Oklahoma City for its records.

Project fieldwork was conducted primarily by staff Research Assistant Susan Allen under the supervision of staff Architectural Historian Marsha Weisiger. Other project personnel included staff Preservation Architect Harry Simms and temporary staff field surveyor Dr. Mary Jane Warde. The final report was prepared by staff Research Assistant Cynthia Smelker under the supervision of staff Architectural Historian Susan Allen. All of the above personnel meet the Secretary of the Interior's qualifications. The survey also used the volunteer service of Jennifer Perryman, David Thach, and Jocelyn Lupkin.

HISTORIC CONTEXT

Jefferson Park, Paseo and Central Park neighborhoods represent the development of Oklahoma City during the early portion of the twentieth century. It was during this time that Oklahoma City was reaching its adolescence with significant growth behind and tremendous evolution yet to come. Oklahoma City's continued expansion was due largely to its varied economic base. The city benefited from the diverse industrial core within its limits, as well as the surrounding agricultural community. Through the first half of the twentieth century, Oklahoma City multiplied many times over. Contained within the three neighborhoods' housing stock is testimony of the city's development.

Oklahoma City's founding did not occur slowly, rather it essentially happened overnight. Congress opened the Oklahoma Territory for settlement to non-Native Americans on 22 April 1889, after much lobbying and several illegal attempts to enter the area were thwarted by the United States Army. To open the new territory, Congress chose an innovative method of land disbursement, the Land Run. This method of opening the area to homesteaders came about for two basic reasons: the heightened public awareness of the opening and potential worth of the land as evidenced by the several Boomer occupations; and, lack of available, productive land elsewhere.¹

The north boundary for this first run was set at the southern line of the Cherokee Outlet, with the 96th or Indian Meridian as the eastern boundary, South Canadian River as the southern and Cheyenne-Arapaho country providing the western border. The federal government surveyed the settlement zone into 160 acre homesteads, with no provision for county lines or townsites beyond certain legal conditions. To create a townsite, the law mandated only that two quarter sections, 320 acres, be joined and platted into homestead lots. The location and viability of the town was strictly up to the founders. To stake a legal claim, the claimant had to be a male citizen at least twenty-one years old; a twenty-one year old or older American female who was single, legally divorced or widowed; or, an immigrant with a declared intention of becoming a naturalized citizen.² Additionally, federal law prohibited homesteaders from occupying a claim earlier than noon on the appointed

day.

Prior to the opening, approximately seven buildings marked the site of the future Oklahoma City, then called Oklahoma Station. These buildings -- a train depot, section house, post office building, government building, railroad agent's home, boarding house and an old stockade -- were aligned along the Santa Fe Railroad located in the bend of the North Canadian River.³ Federal troops maintained a position northeast of the depot the day before the opening in an attempt to prevent "Sooners" -- settlers who staked a claim before the official opening. The unassigned lands opened at noon 22 April 1889, and by evening time, Oklahoma Station had become a flourishing tent city with a population of several thousand.⁴

Oklahoma City, like the majority of nineteenth and twentieth century towns and cities, matured in a fixed pattern but at an accelerated rate. City evolution naturally radiated outward from the center. The central portion of the town, the first area developed, contained the business district with an adjacent residential neighborhood. As the city grew, the original residential zone began to deteriorate as a result of the continued expansion of the business section. In deference to the decline of the first residential zone, the working class located their dwellings outside the initial residential area but within short distances of their place of employment. Seeking newer and improved housing, the middle to upper classes further extended the town by creating a strictly residential area towards the outer limits of the working class section. As the city proceeded to prosper, the upper classes moved to suburban areas lying just outside the incorporated boundaries.⁵ Increases in population and employment opportunities soon resulted in the annexation of the suburban zone into the city proper, and so a metropolis was created.

Unlike most metropolitan areas, Oklahoma City had to grapple with legal problems from the beginning. The army was not wholly successful in deterring eager settlers from claiming ownership of their chosen parcel of land before the official opening. For several years, the courts were filled with cases dealing with Sooners. This problem plagued not only Oklahoma City but the entire Oklahoma Territory. The

largest Sooner problem in the city developed with the Seminole Land and Improvement Company of Topeka, Kansas. The land company began the first plat of the city just "a moment" after the noon opening. Since the nearest point of legal entry was at least eleven to fifteen miles away, the Seminole Land and Improvement Company obviously started their run a little sooner than lawful. One hour and ten minutes after the 12 o'clock bugle initiated the run, the first legal land company, the Oklahoma Town Company, arrived in the city. Within hours, the railroad brought in "train-loads" of lot seekers.⁶

Early development of the city occurred rapidly and somewhat haphazardly. The only plan of the town was the Seminole Land And Improvement Company's, which focused predominately upon the north side of town. Eager land seekers claimed whatever land they could, risking eventual displacement when lots were platted and their claim fell along town streets or alleys. To resolve this problem, the colonists held a meeting on the afternoon of 23 April. The solution the townspeople decided upon was to empower a committee of fourteen men with the authority to plat the townsite and name the streets.⁷

Conflict arose almost immediately between the Committee of 14 and the Seminole Land and Improvement Company. The Seminole Land Company surveyed the town primarily north of today's Main Street, following the course of the Santa Fe Railroad. The Committee of 14 conducted their survey according to the north-south axis up to Grand Avenue, present day Sheridan Avenue. At this point, Main Street and Grand Avenue, it became obvious the two plats differed. If the Committee of 14 continued their survey north of Main Street, they would displace many people who had lawfully acquired a lot from the land company, and disrupt development which was already occurring. Legally, the Seminole Land Company had no rights, so the Committee initially sought to proceed with their survey but public outcry soon halted it. Once again the townspeople selected a committee to determine a reasonable conclusion. This new committee, using both plats, derived an acceptable solution by creating certain irregular east and west lots between Grand Avenue and Main Street. This resulted in permanent jogs along Grand Avenue.⁸

Oklahoma City never experienced the growing pangs of other cities.

From its overnight formation, the city matured rapidly. By June 1889, a scant two months after the opening, the town boundaries were set at Seventh Street on the north, Walker Street to the east, Seventh Street to the south and the Santa Fe Railway on the west. The total population stood at 4,138 people, with the majority being male. There were 1,603 occupied dwellings with sewers, paved streets and sidewalks yet to come.⁹ Of the 1,603 residences, 1,131 were frame houses and 472 were constructed of part canvas and tents.¹⁰

During the 1890s, Oklahoma City grew primarily within the original townsite and to the northeast.¹¹ However, in 1892 Fairlawn Cemetery was established outside the city limits towards the northwest. Internment in the cemetery gained momentum the same year with the relocation of the School Land Cemetery, moved due to its proximity to a train station.¹² By the turn-of-the-century, Oklahoma City was booming with several industries, including two cotton gins, a flour mill, ice factory and three railroads: the Santa Fe, present before the land opening; the Rock Island, which arrived in the city in 1895; and, the Frisco Railroad, which entered the city in 1898.¹³

Progress continued in the ensuing decade, again in a northerly direction. The presence of the railways proved to be a deciding factor in the development of Oklahoma City. The 540 percent increase in city population between 1900 and 1910, from 10,037 to 64,205, is credited largely to the railroads.¹⁴ In 1902, continued city expansion to the north was encouraged by the construction of an electric street railway system. The first street car, owned and operated by the Metropolitan Railway Company, ran on 2 February 1903. By 7 February 1903, the company had five cars on the tracks. Within one year, the Metropolitan Railway Company had reorganized to become the Oklahoma Railway Company and had in service ten cars capable of carrying twenty-eight passengers on four miles of street car tracks.¹⁵ From 1902 to 1904, a building boom in both public and private construction developed. A good deal of this occurred in the residential additions served by the new street car line, although many men continued to walk to work. It was at this time that a discernible movement of single family dwellings away from the Original Townsite and Maywood Addition began.¹⁶ In 1903, the majority

of settlement was contained in the area between North Tenth Street and roughly South Tenth Street. The majority of white collar workers lived north of Second Street, while most of the blue collar workers resided south of Second Street.¹⁷

To accommodate the persistent demand for housing, the city continuously annexed more land. Between 1907 and 1908 alone twenty-two additions were incorporated into the city, bringing a population of three thousand persons. Among these were the Jefferson Park, Grand View, Pleasant View, Guernsey Park, and Fairlawn Cemetery additions.¹⁸ These additions combined with one another and other additions created the Jefferson Park, Paseo and Central Park neighborhoods. This expansion thrust the northern city limits beyond Twenty-third Street to approximately Hill Street. Within a short period of time, the city again extended its limits. The Central Park, Central Northwest Highland and Ross-Mann additions were all incorporated into the city by 1910, extending the city limits to Thirty-sixth Street.¹⁹ These annexations completed expansion of the three neighborhoods to their current limits. Also, combined with relocation of the state capital in 1910 to Oklahoma City, this tremendous growth resulted in another construction boom lasting from 1909 to 1912.²⁰

By 1910, the city boasted 11,516 dwellings, with select residential construction occurring north of Thirty-fourth Street.²¹ Construction was underway in the Jefferson Park, Central Park and Paseo neighborhoods. Between 1900 and 1910, seven of the extant residences in each of the Central Park and Jefferson Park districts were constructed. The Paseo vicinity experienced over double that with nineteen of the existent dwellings being built.

During the 1910s, city development slowed down but in no way halted. Oklahoma City increased in population only 42 percent, down from the phenomenal 540 percent escalation of the previous decade.²² Residential development continued, however, as 918 new families moved into the area and enduring residents sought newer housing.²³ During this decade, the working class was concentrated around Third Street, while the business class resided in the vicinity of Eighth Street.²⁴ Between May 1910 and June 1915, city builders constructed 2,700

dwellings. Although the number of vacant dwellings swelled from 250 in May 1910 to 678 in June 1915, the number of occupied dwellings increased to 2,274 during the same time period.²⁵ Ninety-five percent of the 244 residences built in 1916 were occupied upon completion, with the majority buying their homes instead of renting.²⁶

Whereas Jefferson Park, Central Park and the Paseo never received the grandiose publicity of other neighborhood additions, it was during the 1910s that real estate developers began promotion of Jefferson Park and Central Park. Advertising for both districts occurred in the spring of 1912. The Paseo district was not advertised even to the extent of the other two. However, as the center district, surrounded by Jefferson Park on the east and Central Park on the north, the Paseo benefited from the publicity of the other two neighborhoods.

The real estate company of Goodholm and Sparrow advertised the Jefferson Park area. Notably, the two parks located in Jefferson Park are named after this company, Goodholm and Sparrow. Advertisement of Jefferson Park centered around the amenities procurable in the tract; including wide paved streets, shade and ornamental trees, two city parks, water, gas, electricity, telephone service, sanitary and storm sewers, as well as "hundreds of artistic homes (and) beautiful stretches of lawn."²⁷ Availability and uniqueness of spacious lawns was due to the distinctive neighborhood design of the central portion of Jefferson Park. This atypical configuration followed a pattern of development advocated by Frederick Law Olmstead. Olmstead, and other late nineteenth and early twentieth century American landscape designers, emphasized housing designed around wide and spacious parks, with the result being a haven from the hustle and strain of urban life. Jefferson Park, platted in this design relatively early in 1909, was one of the first examples of this belief in Oklahoma City. Similar landscape design also occurred in the Edgemere Park Historic District, located directly north of Jefferson Park.²⁸

Another 1912 advertisement for Jefferson Park stated "Negroes Can Sign the Guthrie Capital Petition But They Cannot Live in Jefferson Park."²⁹ Under the overlying discriminatory message of this advertisement, this declaration dealt with two issues. The first

referred presumably to the previous political petitions concerning the location of the state capital, moved from Guthrie to Oklahoma City in 1910. The second issue alluded to the restrictive covenants in place in all three neighborhoods prohibiting African-American occupation and ownership of area properties. From Oklahoma's earliest days, African-Americans comprised a significant section of the population. Over two hundred Black Americans participated in the 1889 Land Run. Nearly three hundred African-Americans settled immediately in the Oklahoma City area, with many more settling elsewhere in the Oklahoma and Indian territories. By the turn-of-the-century, the Black population in the state totalled fifty-five thousand individuals. Of this number, twelve hundred African-Americans resided in Oklahoma City. Within ten years of that, the Black population in Oklahoma City numbered almost seven thousand, equalling ten percent of the city's population.³⁰ During the following decades, the African-American community continued to grow along with Oklahoma City.

Until about 1897, Oklahoma and Oklahoma City were fairly well integrated. However, using the "separate but equal" doctrine of the 1896 United States Supreme Court decision in the case of Plessy v. Ferguson, the 1897 territorial legislature mandated racial separation of schools, juries and public facilities. This policy of segregation continued into statehood when the 1907 state legislature, as one of its first undertakings, enacted a "Jim Crow" law restricting use of not only schools and public facilities but also transportation.³¹ The eventual displacement of the political policy of segregation with desegregation occurred in Oklahoma beginning predominately in the 1940s and continuing to the present.

Limited residential segregation in Oklahoma City occurred from the beginning. This was partially attributable to the propensity of like persons to settle in a contained area. This, in turn, was enhanced by prejudice from dissimilar people which was conveyed through both violent and non-violent means. Restrictive covenants, such as the ones included in the Jefferson Park, Central Park and Paseo plats, were a common method utilized in residential segregation. These segregation covenants prohibited occupation of any residence by a non-Euro-American,

specifically African-Americans, in that particular addition. Additionally, Oklahoma City twice passed city ordinances which restricted the areas available for Blacks to live. The first ordinance, in 1916, maintained that it was illegal for a person to take residence in a neighborhood that was already occupied by seventy-five percent of people of another racial origin. This ordinance was overturned in 1919 when challenged by African-American William Floyd, who after a month-long court battle received affirmation of his right to occupy his property located on East Second Street. In 1930, Oklahoma City again passed an ordinance restricting Black occupancy of certain areas populated by a majority of Euro-Americans. After several tense confrontations and court battles, this ordinance was declared in violation of the Fourteenth Amendment and, therefore, void in 1934.

While the city ordinances each lasted only a few years, neighborhood covenants were commonly put in place during the platting of the addition and endured in virtual obscurity for several decades. In Oklahoma City, this type of covenant remained legally viable until 1948. At this time, Judge Lewis R. Morris dismissed a case brought against two Black families on the basis of these segregation covenants. Judge Morris maintained that as the United States Supreme Court ruled such restrictive covenants unconstitutional, he would also. In doing so, Judge Morris set a legal precedent nullifying restrictive covenants. Twenty years later, the Supreme Court reinforced its ruling with the seven to two decision that an 1866 Civil Rights law providing for equal right to inherit, purchase, lease, hold and convey real and personal property banned racial discrimination in the sale or rental of property.³² These rulings obviously revoked the segregation covenants for the Jefferson Park, Central Park and Paseo neighborhoods, and made a mockery of the 1912 Jefferson Park advertisement.

The majority of real estate advertisements rested upon the amenities of the particular area much more than racial composition. However, it must be noted that advertisement of these three districts was aimed at the middle-class Euro-American buyer. This generic type of idealistic advertisements occurred also in Central Park. Within Central Park, the Mann Development Company was the principal advocate and

developer of the area. The Mann Development Company spent twelve thousand dollars in grading and beautification work, including the planting of several thousand trees, between 1911 and May 1912. The company also built thirteen "handsome" homes in the tract during that time. The minimum cost for a home in the Central Park neighborhood at that time was three thousand dollars, with prices ranging from three to ten thousand dollars. The majority of residences cost over five thousand dollars. The Mann Development Company was also working in the Paseo neighborhood but advertisement of this area did not reach the proportions of Central Park.³³

The Mann Development Company touted Central Park as having "good car service direct to the business part of the city; fine school close; paved streets and all modern conveniences." The company and city were responsible for the latter developments, and the closest school at that time was located in the Edgemere Park Historic District, built about 1911. The car service advertised was the Oklahoma Railway Company's electric street car line that extended from the downtown business center along Shartel Avenue. The electric street cars provided an important source of public transportation in all of early day Oklahoma City. Availability of street cars encouraged expansion of the city to areas away from the downtown business district by creating the necessary transportation link between work and home. Essentially all of the electric track within Oklahoma City had been laid by 1916.³⁴ From their beginnings around 1902, use of Oklahoma City street cars reached their zenith in 1919, carrying a total of 17.5 million passengers, up from the 9.5 million passengers in 1915. Riding of street cars fell in 1924 to just about twelve million due to increased automobile travel. In 1925, the railway company put its first buses into operation, further detracting business from the street car system. By 1930, bus service was available throughout the city, including a route north along Walker Avenue, through the Jefferson Park, Central Park and Paseo neighborhoods. Street car use rose briefly again in 1930 to seventeen million but it became increasingly obvious that the future of public transportation was moving ever closer towards buses exclusively.³⁵ Street car service continued in Oklahoma City until 1946, when the

decision to convert to strictly a bus system forced the sale of assets related to inner-city street car lines.³⁶

Placement of the various street car lines was routinely decided by a contract between the Oklahoma Railway Company and property owners in the vicinity of the proposed line. In return for construction of the route in certain areas, real estate owners conveyed related right-of-ways through their property, thus lessening the construction price of the street car line and increasing the value of the area property. Central Park property owners Mary L. Mann et al and the Central Park Realty Company were two of the many who entered into this advantageous arrangement. Mary L. Mann, along with her children, owned the Ross-Mann Addition and the Central Park Realty Company controlled use of the Central Park Addition. Both entered into contractual agreements with the Oklahoma Railway Company in 1909 regarding the line along Shartel Avenue.³⁷ By 1913, this route extended along Shartel Avenue from the downtown to approximately Thirty-third Street and eventually all the way to Thirty-sixth Street.³⁸ Thus, street car service extended through both the Paseo and Central Park neighborhoods. Another line, the Robinson Lane Interurban, traveled along Robinson Avenue through Jefferson Park. This line also originated at the downtown but only extended north to about Twenty-seventh or Twenty-eighth streets.³⁹ From these lines, connections to traverse the entire city, as well as nearby towns and cities, were available.

During the 1910s, when the Shartel and other street cars line were under construction, ninety-two of the extant residences in the Central Park neighborhood were built, equalling about fourteen percent of the total properties remaining. During the same time, ninety-one extant dwellings were built in the Paseo neighborhood, equal to twenty-seven percent of the enduring structures. Jefferson Park had slightly less construction with only eighty-eight, twenty-three percent, of the remaining buildings being constructed. Additionally, the United Presbyterian Church, the first historic church in the three neighborhoods, was constructed in 1917 between Twenty-fifth Street and Shartel Avenue.

The peak of building activity for all three neighborhoods,

however, occurred in the 1920s. It was during this decade, especially the latter half, that Oklahoma City once again entered a boom period. City population experienced a tremendous increase, growing by over one hundred percent in ten years.⁴⁰ While residential development continued north towards Thirty-ninth Street, the 1920s also brought dispersement of the population on a east-west basis. White collar workers continued their northward thrust, with Tenth Street functioning as the southern boundary. Blue collar workers resided primarily in the business district and southern half of Oklahoma City.⁴¹

Valuation of building permits issued in the city increased slowly from about five million dollars in 1920 to eight million dollars in 1924. Permits slumped slightly in 1925 but rebounded admirably to exceed twenty-four million dollars in 1929.⁴² The increased development was credited to the city's critical locale. As stated by the 1929 president of the Chamber of Commerce, Ed Overholser, "No city is better situated with respect to variety and volume of resources within its own trade territory." Companies associated with agriculture, utilities and various industries continued to locate in the Oklahoma City area, creating persistent demand for housing.⁴³

The prosperity of the Roaring Twenties enabled many to purchase their own home and, at the same time, attracted more buyers to the city. As a result, much of the "desirable close-in residential property in Oklahoma City" was built up. Furthermore, expanded use of the automobile enabled residents to live further away from their place of business and yet reach them with more convenience and in less time.⁴⁴

As three of the relatively "close in" residential districts, Jefferson Park, Central Park and the Paseo flourished. Limited advertising continued for Central Park during the 1920s. By 1924, G. A. Nichols, Incorporated was advertising the sale of the "only thirty four lots left" in a two block area of Central Park.⁴⁵ Other real estate companies took out small advertisements for houses for sale in the three neighborhoods but no large scale promotion occurred.

During the 1920s, sixty-two percent of the remaining structures in Jefferson Park were constructed. One hundred and thirty of the total 240 buildings were built between 1920 and 1922. Activity stabilized in

Jefferson Park with an average of fifteen dwellings being built each year between 1924 and 1928. The neighborhood experienced an upsurge in building activity in 1929 with thirty-five new buildings. This was the last year of significant construction in Jefferson Park. In Central Park, seventy-five percent of the extant dwellings were built during the decade. The majority of these, 134, were built in 1925, with over fifty residences being built each year in 1922, 1926 and 1927. Although substantially lower than Jefferson Park and Central Park, the Paseo neighborhood also experienced its greatest growth in the 1920s. Thirty-eight percent of the remaining houses were constructed in the 1920s. Construction in the Paseo was distributed fairly evenly throughout the decade, with an average of approximately fourteen new residences per year.

The 1920s also boosted construction of public buildings to serve community needs in the three neighborhoods. To fill the expanding educational demands of the area children, Harding Junior High was constructed in the Central Park area in 1924. It was also during this boom decade that two more historic churches were constructed in the area. Situated in the middle of the Central Park and Paseo neighborhoods, the Central Park Methodist Church was built in 1929. Also in 1929, the Hudson Avenue Baptist Church was constructed in Jefferson Park. Additionally, the classical Fairlawn Cemetery Mausoleum was built between 1924 and 1925. Designed by architects Sidney Lovell and Leonard Bailey, the stately mausoleum contained space for approximately five hundred crypts. A few of the notable people interred in the Mausoleum included Jasper Sipes (1860-1940), Governor Martin Trapp, Dennis T. Flynn (1861-1939), Streeter B. Flynn (1892-1971) and John Shartel.⁴⁶

The only major non-residential development in the three neighborhoods occurred in about 1929. At this time, G. A. Nichols, Incorporated undertook development of the Spanish Village, a relatively small business area in the northeast corner of the Paseo neighborhood. Promotion of this area rested upon its unique "Spanish" atmosphere, conveyed principally through the Mission and Spanish Colonial Revival architecture.⁴⁷ National recognition of the significance of this

commercial zone was bestowed in 1983 when the Spanish Village was listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Although occurring near the end of the majority of the neighborhoods' development, the establishment of the Spanish Village enhanced the desirability of the Jefferson Park, Paseo and Central Park neighborhoods by creating easily accessible shopping. Other commercial development also transpired on the periphery streets of the three neighborhoods, concentrating around Twenty-third Street, and Walker and Western avenues. Some of these enterprises probably developed contemporaneous with or prior to construction of the Spanish Village. Many of these businesses occupied the older residential structures present before commercialization of the exterior streets.

Probably the greatest economic incentive during the late 1920s and 1930s was the discovery of oil in the Oklahoma City vicinity in 1924 and within the city itself in 1928. Oklahoma City benefited greatly from its central location in the Mid-Continent oil field, one of the largest producers of oil in the United States in the latter 1920s and 1930s. Largely due to the presence of oil and its related industries, Oklahoma City was able to sustain growth during the Great Depression of the 1930s.⁴⁸ The city gained about five to ten thousand people each year from a base population of 189,389 in 1930.⁴⁹ Oil contributed to another facet of development within the city, apartment houses. The influx of people employed by the flourishing oil and related industrial companies, requiring only a temporary place to live, created an unprecedented demand for apartments. Apartment house construction also received a boost from oil men, as well as others with money, who viewed apartments as a good, solid investment. Apartment house investors commonly received an "assured" return of fourteen percent on their investment.⁵⁰ Usually built of brick, with not more than four stories, apartments routinely consisted of one room, a bath and kitchenette.⁵¹

During the late 1920s and early 1930s, apartment building in Oklahoma City concentrated north of Twenty-third Street, around Robinson and Walker avenues, in the midst of the Jefferson Park, Central Park and Paseo neighborhoods.⁵² Of the three districts, Jefferson Park had the highest number of extant apartment houses with sixty-six. The Paseo

neighborhood contained a total of thirty-nine remaining buildings. Central Park had only eleven existent apartment buildings.

One of the well-known Oklahoma City development companies involved in apartment house construction was G. A. Nichols Incorporated. Erecting apartment buildings was touted as Nichols' "hobby". Nichols Incorporated built at least ten apartments in the Paseo neighborhood. The company's architectural staff carefully designed four-family apartments in the Paseo, as well as several other residential districts, that were "as beautiful in exterior line and interior finish as the best private residences". After completion, Nichols routinely sold the apartments to investors.⁵³

Apartment houses, however, did not comprise a large percentage of the building stock in the neighborhoods. Apartment buildings equalled only two percent of the extant structures in Central Park. More common in the Jefferson Park and Paseo neighborhoods, eighteen percent and fifteen percent respectively of the remaining dwellings were apartment houses. Although the majority of residences in the districts were single residences, other types of multiple dwellings were also popular. Popular types of multiple dwellings include duplexes and garage apartments. Eleven percent of the remaining residences in the Paseo neighborhood were non-apartment building multiple dwellings. In Central Park, twelve percent of the housing stock were a combination of duplexes and garage apartments. The number of multiple dwellings in Jefferson Park nearly equalled that of apartment houses with seventeen percent of the extant structures classified as non-apartment house multiple dwellings.

Although the oil industry and related developments bolstered city finances, Oklahoma City, of course, did not completely escape the ruthless path of the Great Depression. Due to the harsher impact of the depression on rural and small town residents, Oklahoma City experienced an inundation of new citizens seeking jobs, housing and aid. This naturally contributed to the economic burden of the city. In the early depression years, camps of substandard housing developed along the North Canadian River and destitute Oklahomans filled the soup lines.⁵⁴ The dust bowls of 1935 and 1936 sent many people scurrying to the greater

stability of the city, intensifying the need for affordable housing.⁵⁵

The city's real estate market's great depression, however, seemed to ease by the mid-1930s. This is attributable in part to the upswing in population resulting from the gravitation towards the city and a lessening in the downward slide of the economy as a whole. According to the 1934 Oklahoma City Real Estate Board, half of the residential properties vacant in 1933 were occupied the following year. In April 1935, the Real Estate Board declared a shortage of 1,100 housing units necessary to provide adequate shelter for a population the size of Oklahoma City's.⁵⁶

During the 1930s, only forty of the extant dwellings were constructed in Central Park. This is a sharp drop from the 1920s but it can not be wholly contributed to the Great Depression. After the remarkable building boom of the previous decade, little vacant area remained for new residences. By 1930, eighty-nine percent of the houses in the Central Park neighborhood had been constructed. Construction in the Paseo neighborhood also dropped in the 1930s to merely forty-seven of the remaining dwellings. Again this can be attributed to the majority of the district, seventy-one percent, already being built up. Building activity in Jefferson Park also declined during the decade with only thirty-two new buildings being constructed. Similar to the Central Park and Paseo districts, eighty-seven percent of the Jefferson Park neighborhood was built prior to 1930.

Oklahoma City continued to thrive through the 1940s, with the establishment of Midwest Air Depot, now Tinker Air Force base, in 1941. The depot, located to the southeast of the city, boosted the monetary resources of Oklahoma City by creating nearly fifteen thousand civilian jobs at the depot and an additional twenty-three thousand jobs at the related Douglas Cargo Plane Plant. The Douglas Plant manufactured many cargo and other types of planes necessary for successful deployment in World War II. This new economic force allowed Oklahoma City to come out of the Great Depression with a roar. The depot has continued to perform an important role in city finances to the present day.⁵⁷

The depot, however, spurred residential growth in a new direction -- the southeast. Midwest City, located at the depot's front gate,

developed quickly between 1941 and 1943.⁵⁸ Other residential development continued in that direction with Del City a few years later.

Limited construction continued in the Jefferson Park, Central Park and Paseo neighborhoods to the current time. Central Park and Jefferson Park were essentially fully developed by the end of the 1930s. During the 1940s, only twenty-three of the extant residences were built in Central Park. From the 1950s to the early 1990s, only ten new dwellings were built in the Central Park area. Only four of the remaining dwellings constructed in Jefferson Park were built in the 1940s. Over the following four decades, merely seventeen buildings were constructed in the Jefferson Park district. The Paseo neighborhood experienced sustained development through the 1940s and 1950s. Nineteen of the existent structures were built in the Paseo district during the 1940s and eighteen in the 1950s. During the subsequent three decades, only fourteen buildings were constructed in the area.

The dwellings in the Central Park, Jefferson Park and Paseo neighborhoods reflected not only the boom periods of Oklahoma City but also the common appearance of Oklahoma towns and cities. The typical architectural style of house in Oklahoma during the first half of the twentieth century was the Bungalow. With its multiple windows, the Bungalow house was well suited to the humid Oklahoma climate. Within the three neighborhoods, fifty percent of the extant houses in the Paseo were Bungalows, with forty-nine percent in Jefferson Park and forty-six percent in Central Park classified the same. Houses designed in the Tudor Revival and Colonial Revival styles were also popular throughout the general state.⁵⁹ Correspondingly, the second most fashionable style in all three neighborhoods was Tudor Revival. Other less prevalent architectural styles in the three districts included National Folk, Colonial Revival, Classical Revival, Mission/Spanish Colonial Revival and Prairie School.

The Paseo, Central Park and Jefferson Park neighborhoods developed as essentially separate entities but each shared certain characteristics with at least one of the other districts, as well as with additional contemporaneous city neighborhoods. The Paseo area developed fairly steadily through the 1900s to the 1950s, with a burst of activity in the

1920s. Although composed of a majority of one family residences, the Paseo neighborhood contained a significant concentration of historic apartment houses. Central Park, on the other hand, underwent only two real decades of substantial growth. During the 1910s, limited construction occurred in the area, however, exceptional growth within the district did not materialize until the 1920s. Constructed principally of single family houses, Central Park experienced little construction activity in the succeeding decades. Similar to Central Park, Jefferson Park developed primarily during the 1910s and 1920s. The 1920s again proved to be the decade of growth with scant construction occurring afterwards. Unlike Central Park but akin to the Paseo, historic apartment buildings endowed the Jefferson Park area with a distinct character. The period of significance for both the Jefferson Park and Paseo neighborhoods extends from construction of the first extant residences in 1905 to 1944, while Central Park's period of significance dates from the earliest surviving construction in 1906 to 1944.

Although the city has since spread far beyond these early districts, the Jefferson Park, Central Park and Paseo neighborhoods represent an important stage in the evolution of Oklahoma City. It was during the first half of the twentieth century, when the three neighborhoods were developing, that Oklahoma City began its transformation from a Victorian town to a modern metropolis.
