## More than Lincofn: Life in a Log Cabin

## Objective:

This lesson plan involves individual research by students to then write a letter about pioneer experiences.

## Oklahoma Academic Standards:

## Vocabulary

Pioneer: One of the first to settle in a territory
Conestoga wagon: a large covered wagon used for long-distance travel
Log cabin: a dwelling constructed of logs, usually temporary and less finished
Butter churn: a device used to convert cream into butter through a mechanical process

## Activity:

Have students research and explore what life was like for pioneers traveling on covered wagons and then living inside log cabins. This can be done through books and written material, or through online resources.

After researching, students will write a detailed letter back to their family in Boston. It will need to include information about the journey, what they brought in their wagon, and how life is at the log cabin, including food, games, and hardships.
